It's a Breeze

When you stand at the top of a knoll on the 18.9 acres Gwynneth Rooke donated in the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville on a hot, humid day you will understand why green, open spaces are so important to cooling the climate.

Forest cover on the property shades an important water recharge area. Rather than running south toward Bloomington Road, where trucks can be heard rumbling by, waters here slowly flow through a wetland complex and eventually find their way to Lake Simcoe.

This height of land has seen a number of Red-shouldered hawks and other species of birds soaring on the breezes that cool the land. Now, with generous forethought on the part of the land donor, it will continue to provide home and water for many species.

The Oak Ridges Moraine Land Trust is honored to add Gwynneth Rooke to the list of land donors interested in protecting the Oak Ridges Moraine.

When you stand on a sidewalk in Toronto on a hot, humid day and feel a cooled, fresh breeze flowing your way from the Oak Ridges Moraine, you can thank Gwynneth.



Natural Linkages in Land Donation

A donation of 10.57 acres in Richmond Hill by Heather and John Emery to the Land Trust gives pause to think about 'linkages'.

Links on the ground include the property within the White Rose/Preston Lake Provincially Significant Wetland Complex (small linked wetlands) and headwaters of the Rouge River. Water falling here links many people and activities all the way to Scarborough and Pickering at Lake Ontario.

The property is designated Natural Linkage Area under the Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan and is part of an important, narrow corridor of green space, linking east to west, through a quickly

intensifying area.

And then, there is the Bobolink, a COSEWIC threatened species, known to have been present in the open hay field coverage of the property in 2002.

Finally, in a new twist for the Land Trust, Heather is the daughter of James and Ann McLeod who donated land in Aurora in 2006, so we have links by birth and a second generation of land donors!

On behalf of all who will benefit from greater protection of ecological functions on the Oak Ridges Moraine, please link your voices together and say "thank you for your donation John and Heather".

Connecting Neighbours

How many of us know our next-door neighbours? How many of us realize how connected we are with what we do, or what our neighbours do? Whether we know them or not, we are connected. The air we breathe, the animals we see, the forests we enjoy and the waters that flow in our neighbourhoods join us together.

Realizing that the value of protected areas increases when these areas are connected and not “stand alone” parcels, the Land Trust has launched a program to connect neighbours around properties where Conservation Easements have been registered.

Committed land owners host a casual gathering, inviting in known and as-yet-unmet neighbouring property owners to hear about why they have entered into protection of the moraine with the registration of a Conservation Easement. Tax benefits and legal considerations are discussed along with many stories about what the neighbours value about their lands and their place on the moraine.

Through this, participants learn, among other things, that protecting lands does not mean there is public access to privately held property. Rather, public benefit through protection may result in



tax and capital gains deductions. They learn about networking with any number of stewardship organizations in pursuit of goals laid out in a property management plan. They learn that each Conservation Easement is uniquely tailored to their long-term desire for their property. Most importantly, neighbours learn that property protection is a whole different twist on “keeping up with the Joneses.”

If you are a current Conservation Easement holder and would like to connect with your neighbours to investigate greater protection of natural features in your neighbourhood, contact the Land Trust office.

If you are a land owner with property of 25 acres or more and have neighbours with similar sized or larger properties and would like to learn more about Conservation Easements and other protection options as a group, we'd like to hear from you too!

With 90% of the moraine in private ownership, connecting neighbours is the only feasible way to protect important ecological functions and the many diverse habitats found here. We are all connected, and together as good neighbours, we can offer better protection, stewardship and sustainability to the Oak Ridges Moraine.

This Recipe is for the Birds!

Local food has been enjoyed across the moraine for thousands of years. Together with land owners the Land Trust helps to sustain the supply. When a property or conservation easement is donated it's just the beginning of a productive relationship that benefits more than just the human species.

Property management plans prepared with land owner input detail restoration and other activities for the property to enhance natural features and biodiversity. A 150 acre property in Scugog Township is a perfect example of mixing up the ingredients on the landscape to please a variety of palates and provide food through the year.

"Adding fruit or nut bearing trees and shrubs as was done on this property is an excellent way to provide crucial food

resources for over-wintering birds," notes Bill McMartin, the Land Trust's Stewardship expert. A selection of shrubs complement the extensive tree planting already undertaken by the property owners. An impressive variety of birds are attracted to this property due to the combination of adequate food and shelter.

Among the species enjoyed by the land owners during the winter months is the Bohemian Waxwing. They are easily distinguished from the commoner Cedar Waxwings by the bright orange of their under-tail coverts (small feathers that surround the bases of the larger feathers). The orange is visible in any position except with the bird facing directly away from the observer.

A well-seasoned birder himself, Bill advises, "With the right mix

of shrubs like Choke cherry, Common Elderberry, Gray dogwood, Nannyberry and many other native species, you'll be rewarded with years of low cost entertainment and many winter birds to add to your list as they enjoy the buffet you've planted for them."

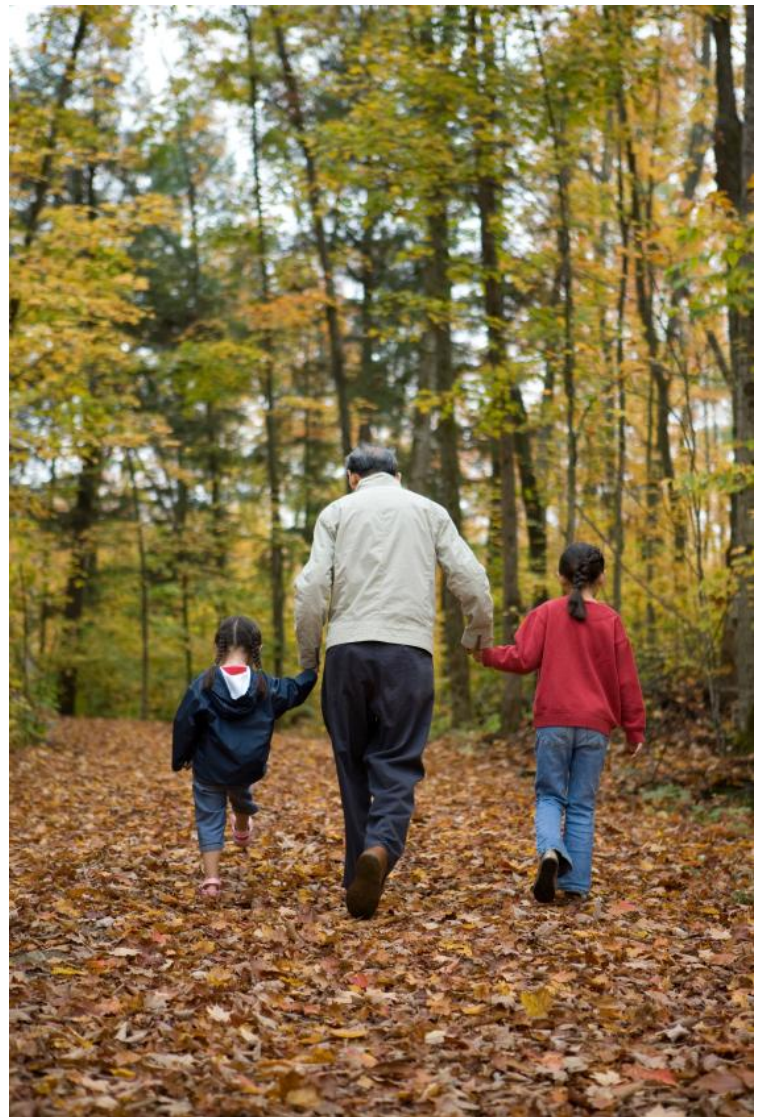

Consider what an acre of green space on the Oak Ridges Moraine, whether covered with forest, wetlands or open meadow does for all of us: cleaning air, cooling the climate, cleaning and regulating water, protecting us from run-off and erosion, sheltering wildlife, contributing to pollination, providing a space for recreation, dispersal of seeds and several other functions.

Ninety-percent of the Oak Ridges Moraine is in private ownership, protection of these functions lies in private hands.

Who among us has not heard or uttered these words? And the inevitable answer, “No, but soon, be patient.”

Your Land Trust has been on such a journey for the past year: a \$1 Million campaign to fund our work. Looked at in linear terms across the moraine with the destination at Cramahe Township, (north and east of Cobourg at the eastern end of the Oak Ridges Moraine), we’d have traveled from Airport Road to Highway 400.

At over \$200,000 raised to date, the pleasure of the journey has been in the generous donations of individuals and private foundations. Like a real journey across the moraine there is diversity to be seen at every turn – that’s where you fit in. There is no “pit stop”, the work to be done continues. Added diversity and contributions from individuals, corporations, donations large and small - will add up and complete our trip.

Approximately one-third of the \$1 Million will support active protection of more lands over the next three years, including the Trust’s share of legal, assessment, surveys and other costs. Sights are set on 600 more acres as a minimum goal.

Another third of the funds will allow for three years of focused outreach to professionals such as financial planners, lawyers and real estate agents to explain how beneficial conservation easements can be within client portfolios. At the same time, outreach will concentrate on building ever-widening understanding among community thought leaders and groups about the ecological importance of the moraine.

The remaining amount will be invested to support required annual monitoring of each property, currently 37 individual holdings, for many years to come.

Are we there yet? No, but with your help we can get there faster.
